

Helliwell Provincial Park Illustrates Weather Extremes

This year's weather extremes, from an extraordinarily rainy spring to a persistent summer-fall drought, created dramatic visual expression at Helliwell Provincial Park on Hornby Island.

My family has visited this marvelous park many times, and what we saw on two trips this year stood out as abnormal from our general experience. When we hiked about seven kilometres around the park in June, the wildflower wonderland woven into the green carpet of the meadows and forest edges surprised us. During past June visits we typically found myriad wildflowers, but they were nestled among grasses with hues of brown and gold as well as green.



This year it was almost like encountering the park for the first time, or discovering that it had a character previously unrevealed. The lush green grasses harboured many flowers that we couldn't recall seeing before. Typically boasting a drier climate than nearby areas, Hornby

this year vividly benefited from the extra moisture.

Returning to the park in late October, we knew the landscape would be dressed in much more subdued colours. But we weren't prepared for the up-close view of the drought's severity.

Last October we saw patches of green here and there on the bluffs. This year only the trees and a few bushes near the headlands offered any green contrast to the golds and browns.

While the park’s meadows were scorched, they still contributed to the natural splendour that was evident in so

many ways. We watched orcas spouting while the wind off of the water bent the grasses towards the shore pine and the forest of Garry oaks, Douglas-fir, and Arbutus.

More extreme weather in coming years seems inevitable, and the impact on the park could be significant. But what-

ever changes the climate may bring, Helliwell — with its sweeping vistas of meadows, forest, distinctive shore line, the sea, and Vancouver Island — will retain a personality unique in the Gulf Islands. ≈






November Booklist

INDIANS ON VACATION

by Thomas King



'Indians On Vacation' is one of Thomas King's latest publications (2020). Many will know his writing through the popular Dreadful Water mysteries, but 'The Inconvenient Indian: a curious account of

native people in North America' (2012) caught wide public attention. 'Indians On Vacation' manages to capture our lead character Blackbird Mavrias as he tries to sort out his inner turmoil (personal demons are all named) while traipsing around eastern Europe with his partner Mimi. This novel includes everything – King's incredible knack for laugh out loud humour when you least expect it, important commentary concerning indigenous issues, a very creative approach to someone's midlife look at personal values, and even the mystery of a hunt for a long dead uncle who used to travel Europe in Wild West shows! Another great book by King. It also won the Stephen Leacock Award for Humour in 2021, and it's available at our VURL. — Neil Ross

THE BISHOP'S MAN


PERMANENT ASTONISHMENT




SUCH A GOOD MOTHER




THE LINCOLN HIGHWAY





A couple of 'winner' recipes for your holiday entertaining . . .

One Pot TURKEY TETRAZZINI

I tried making this dish with Thanksgiving leftover turkey and it turned out wonderfully. Even I was able to easily put it together and would highly recommend it for an after-Christmas dish. There was plenty to feed two, with leftovers of the leftovers for yet another meal for us. All cooks in one pan!

Serves 4.

INGREDIENTS

- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 tablespoon butter
- 2 tsp minced garlic
- 1 small yellow onion chopped
- 6 oz. white mushrooms washed, sliced
- 2 cups chicken or vegetable stock
- 2 cups whole milk
- 2 tablespoons cornstarch
- 1 tsp salt divided
- 1/2 tsp ground black pepper divided
- 8 oz. spaghetti noodles dry
- 2 cups leftover turkey meat diced
- 1/4 cup sour cream
- 1/2 cup grated Parmesan cheese
- parsley for garnish

METHOD

In a large saucepan or skillet with lid, heat up oil and butter. Add garlic and onion and saute until onion is almost translucent. Add mushrooms, season with salt and pepper and cook until fragrant and soft.

In a small mixing bowl or large measuring cup, whisk together milk and cornstarch. Add salt and pepper and whisk. Set aside.

To mushroom mixture in skillet, add diced turkey meat, dry spaghetti noodles (can be broken in half), chicken stock and cornstarch mixture. Stir well. Make sure all noodles are submerged in liquid. Bring mixture to boil, then lower the heat to medium-low and simmer covered,

stirring often until the noodles are done, about 12 to 14 minutes. Remove from heat. Let cool for 5 minutes. Add sour cream and Parmesan cheese and stir well. Serve immediately, garnished with parsley.

NOTES

To freeze: do not add sour cream and cheese after noodles are cooked. Simply cool the dish completely, then transfer to a freezer safe container. When ready to serve, thaw in fridge, let stand in room temperature for 15 to 20 minutes, heat up in saucepan or skillet. Then add sour cream and Parmesan cheese and serve.

Homemade CRACKERJACKS

A favourite at Hallowe'en and Christmastime . . . yes, THAT recipe! From Kasey Wilson's cookbook 'Gifts From The Kitchen', lent to me by Shelly Hollingshead

Note: Makes about 2 L. Can be doubled or tripled (cook syrup for same length of time)

INGREDIENTS

- 1/2 C golden brown or best brown sugar
- 1/4 C butter
- 2 T dark or clear corn syrup
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 1 T molasses



Add after boiling: 1/4 tsp baking soda

2 qts. (8 C) popped popcorn

1/2 C salted roasted peanuts (I used dry-roasted, seasoned peanuts)

METHOD


1. Preheat oven to 250°F
2. In a saucepan, combine brown sugar, butter, corn syrup, salt and molasses and bring to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer for 3 minutes. Remove from heat, **add soda and stir until creamy.**
3. Pour over popcorn, sprinkle peanuts on top and stir to coat. Spread on lightly greased cookie sheet and bake for 30 minutes. After cooling for a few minutes, lift under popcorn to loosen from pan. As it all hardens, break into pieces with your metal spatula or wide knife, cool completely, pack in cellophane bags or tins and label.




